Volunteerism Definition Volunteerism is voluntary, deliberate service to others over time and without compensation. A key element of volunteer behavior is that the person freely chooses to help and has no expectation of pay or other compensation. Mandatory public service required by courts or schools would not meet the definition of volunteerism.

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This chapter analyzes volunteerism through the lens of eight different human behavior theories. From a strengths perspective, volunteerism provides an opportunity to consider these theories without advancing a view of individuals, groups, and communities as pathological or deviant.

The literature surrounding volunteerism will also be reviewed, and one theory that directly relates to volunteer motivation will be examined.

Motivational factors that encourage volunteers

A review of 20 studies of the personality characteristics of community volunteers for students' volunteer motivations concluded that volunteers had higher moral standards, had higher self-esteem, were more empathic, and were more emotionally stable than non-volunteer students (Allen & Rushton

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1983).
